



# Attorneys Fogg and Isele Will Discuss New Rules for Facilities for the Aging

Attorneys **Robert J. Fogg** and **William P. Isele** of the law firm of Archer, P.C., will present "Retorts, Reports and Last Resorts: An Update on State Reporting Requirements" at the annual conference of the New Jersey Association for Homes and Services for the Aging (NJAHSA).

The three-day conference, titled Charting Our Course, begins on May 27, 2008, at the Trump Taj Mahal in Atlantic City, N.J. Included will be a discussion of new requirements under the Violence Prevention in Health Care Act, which became law on Jan. 3, 2008, and the regulations under the Patient Safety Act, which were promulgated on March 3, 2008.
